On Saturday, April 16, a magnitude 7.8 earthquake struck the northwestern coast of Ecuador, killing more than 670 people and injuring almost 28,000 more. The quake—the worst to hit the country since 1987—leveled buildings, destroyed roads and bridges, damaged structures and triggered landslides—leaving thousands of people without shelter, food and water while aftershocks continued to shake the country.

In the months following the earthquake, Operation USA collected in-kind materials and relief supplies from corporate donors for delivery to affected communities. We also partnered with All Hands Volunteers, deploying volunteers to impacted areas of the Manabi Province to rebuild homes. With funding from OpUSA donors, the team was able to build eleven safe, permanent structures for families in need, allowing them to focus on rebuilding their lives and livelihoods.

EDUCATION SUPPORT & HURRICANE RELIEF IN HAITI

In 2016, Operation USA continued to support ongoing needs at Ecole Nationale Jacob Martin Henriquez in Jacmel, including a feeding program—which provides a daily hot meal to more than 600 students—and ongoing maintenance of school facilities. OpUSA also continued our partnership with Fondation L'Athletique, supporting

children in some of Haiti's most poverty-stricken areas through a variety of sports and after school programs. As in previous years, we focused on youth empowerment, education and nutrition so that students in Jacmel have more opportunities to learn, grow and thrive every day.

Early in October, Hurricane Matthew, a category four storm, struck Haiti. In addition to flooding and structural damage, Haitians also faced a resurged cholera outbreak and limited access to food and clean water in communities still vulnerable from the devastating 2010 earthquake. More than 1,000 people were killed, with thousands more displaced, and the UN estimated as many as one million people were in need of assistance in the storm's aftermath. Operation USA quickly coordinated relief efforts with partners in Jacmel and the surrounding areas.

In December, OpUSA distributed relief kits containing hygiene items, tarps, water purification supplies and food to families in the hardest hit areas of Grand Anse—Nippes, Cayemites and Pestel. Relief efforts will continue in Jacmel in 2017.

ONGOING EARTHQUAKE RECOVERY IN NEPAL

Last year, after Nepal was devastated by two massive earthquakes and subsequent aftershocks, Operation USA made a commitment to the heavily-impacted rural village of Fyakse, in the Dhading District. There, we pledged to support relief and recovery efforts aimed at repairing education systems and supporting students and their families, and we went on to deliver much-needed winterization supplies and funding for healthcare supplies to the community.



In 2016, along with partner organization Rebuild Nepal, we broke ground on the reconstruction of a new secondary school facility in Fyakse. The school will serve approximately 350 students, many from ethnic minority groups, in kindergarten through tenth grade with eight classrooms and bathroom facilities, giving local students a safe space to learn and grow. The new Shree Panchkanya school is on target to open in early 2017.

CONTINUED RESILIENCY BUILDING IN THE PHILIPPINES

Following the devastating typhoon that struck the Philippines in 2013, Operation USA worked diligently in Guiuan—a small coastal community in Eastern Samar—to rebuild lives for impacted families. There, in 2015, alongside long-time partner Honeywell, we

opened an elementary school serving more than 260 students in kindergarten through sixth grade. The school provides a safe learning environment for children, and also serves as an evacuation center for local families in the event of future storms.

In 2016, OpUSA staff had the pleasure of attending the new school's first ever graduation ceremony, where the resilience of the community's children was on display as sixth graders joyfully celebrated their achievements with teachers, classmates and family. Also this year—thanks to the generosity of donors and partners—we delivered a number of new learning enhancements to the school, including laptop computers, projectors, story books, Internet connectivity, ceiling fans and, soon, a science learning garden.

SUPPORTING ETHIOPIAN CHILDREN

In 2016, Operation USA continued to work with the Pulitzer Foundation to provide quality psychosocial support to the most disadvantaged and vulnerable children throughout Ethiopia. In February, Richard Walden visited the country to meet with partners and assess further needs for area children who benefit from the program.



CALIFORNIA CLINICS PROGRAM

For 35 years, Operation USA has worked to fill the gaps in community healthcare and meet the needs of Southern California clinics serving those most in need of medical attention and treatment. With the generosity of donors like Kaiser-Permanente, we continue to provide medical supplies and equipment at no charge to these clinics, supporting our uninsured and under-served neighbors in need.

YOUTH EMPOWERMENT WITH THE AWESOME GIRLS IN LOUISIANA

Girls participating in the Awesome Girls program face many challenges and encounter many barriers to healthy growth and development. Operation USA has enthusiastically supported the Awesome Girls since Hurricane Katrina devastated New Orleans in

2005, and in the years since has provided funding and support for a variety of programs aimed at nurturing the girls, building resilience, and fostering life-affirming behavior—all while having fun and connecting with their peers.

This year, OpUSA made a grant to the Awesome Girls Program for general program support. These funds allowed program leaders to incorporate strategies and tools—which enhance learning and skills development—into programming, so that the girls and their families are better equipped for the future. We are proud to continue to partner with such a wonderful program.



SUPPORTING NATIVE AMERICAN YOUTH

Operation USA began working on the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota in 2014. There, we've supported winterization and heating programs, provided funding for youth development initiatives, and expanded partnerships to enhance learning opportunities for area youth. In 2016, we continued to assess new program opportunities, focusing on mental wellness and youth empowerment in order to address pervasive challenges for those living on Pine Ridge and the nearby Rosebud Reservation.

This Fall, The Pine Ridge Girls School—our new partner—opened its doors to the first class of 6th and 7th grade girls. The school's mission is "to provide an academically rigorous program grounded in the Lakota culture and language, to afford students the skills and confidence for college and beyond so they can successfully pursue their career and life ambitions and participate in the regeneration of their people."

In partnership with the school, Operation USA built a basketball court on the PRGS campus, and we look forward to a long-term partnership with this inspiring new partner!



NEW PROGRAM! PROJECT RE:VERB

In 2016, Operation USA launched a new cross-cultural youth initiative aimed at connecting young people from the Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota, post-Katrina New Orleans, Louisiana, and earthquake-impacted Jacmel, Haiti. Working with local youth-centered partners, Project Re:VERB began as a pilot program engaging young people through the lenses of their peers, helping them to learn about their diverse communities.

Through arts projects and digital media, young leaders participating in Project Re:VERB are cultivating their voices to teach one another about their unique life experiences, learn about the issues that directly impact them, and broaden their awareness beyond their own neighborhoods. They are drawing on positive identities and community strengths to inspire one another and foster solidarity with their peers. By empowering youth to re-imagine their futures, Project Re:VERB is helping young leaders to affect positive change in their lives and communities.

As funding allows, we look forward to expanding to include more communities and organizing service learning trips in the coming years.




MATERIAL AID + SHIPPING

In 2016, domestic shipments dominated Operation USA's material aid program. As in previous years, we continued to place less emphasis on the shipment of higher value pharmaceuticals, instead focusing on the shipment of medical equipment and supplies of which the intrinsic value and shelf life may be greater to end users at clinics and hospitals.

Also this year, we responded rapidly to the major earthquake in Ecuador—delivering shelter and lighting materials provided by Cascade Designs and Pelican Products, Inc. Apotex, a major provider of generic medications, and Kaiser-Permanente Health Systems remain our two largest supply donors, and provide invaluable contributions to our ongoing clinics supply program.

In the year ahead we plan to increase shipments to Cambodia and Myanmar, and will maintain a disaster inventory in our Port of Los Angeles warehouse for immediate deployment as needed to disaster sites here and throughout the world. We thank all our corporate donors and partners who make this work possible.


RECOMMITTING TO HAITI

Our partners in Haiti are facing renewed challenges in the wake of Hurricane Matthew, as already vulnerable communities once again face an uphill battle in recovery. Limited access to food and clean water, damaged homes, lack of income-generating opportunities and a resurgence of cholera continue to challenge Haitian families who have struggled to recover since the earthquake that devastated their country in 2010. Operation USA remains committed to the city of Jacmel and Ecole Nationale JM Henriquez, and will continue to provide aid and enhance ongoing programs there and in other nearby communities in which there is great need.
