



DEAR FRIENDS,

In 2018—our 39th year—our programs were largely a continuation of response efforts launched in the wake of last year's seemingly unending string of disasters.

Communities across the United States and around the world are still in the early stages of recovery as families who were impacted by 2017 disasters—Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria, earthquakes in Mexico and wildfires in California—begin to rebuild their lives and livelihoods. Meanwhile, new disasters wreak havoc on already vulnerable areas. Here at home, Hurricanes Michael and Florence brought new devastation to the southern Atlantic coast this year, while California faced its worst wildfire season on record. Elsewhere in the world, refugees continue to flee areas torn apart by violence in Syria, Myanmar, Yemen and Central America, straining resources in neighboring areas, while African communities faced a renewed outbreak of Ebola, and climate change continues to worsen the impact of prolonged natural disasters like drought and famine. We are living in a time of unprecedented need.

I am so proud of Operation USA's ongoing commitment to addressing global needs and improving the lives of the most under-served and overlooked children and families. Though we are a small, privately-funded NGO, with your support we have provided vital material aid and funding to community-based partners in disaster zones for nearly 40 years. This year, we distributed I9 major grants to partner organizations and delivered 20 shipments of material aid to communities in need. Thanks to the generous support of our individual donors, foundations and corporate partners, we had a measurable and meaningful impact on the lives of tens of thousands of people who were made vulnerable by disaster, who lost homes and loved ones, and who greatly needed support and hope—in the immediate aftermath of disaster and long-term.

As we enter our 40th year and reflect on four decades of humanitarian aid, I am most grateful for your continued support. Without you, our work would not be possible. Every donation helps us respond to new disasters quickly and effectively, while also enabling us to remain committed for the long haul—supporting communities devasted by disaster for years to come.



DOMESTIC DISASTER RESPONSE

HURRICANE HARVEY RECOVERY · TEXAS

In August 2017, Hurricane Harvey—a Category 4 storm—hit Texas, causing extensive damage and massive losses for hundreds of thousands of people. Though more than a year has passed since the devastating storm, recovery has only just begun for many who were impacted.

This year, Operation USA remained committed to helping those who were hardest hit by Hurricane





In January, we delivered a grant to the Alliance for Multicultural Services to support impacted families with mental health care, psychological support and emotional recovery—ensuring that those who were vulnerable after the storm had guidance in gaining access to available resources for recovery. In July, we delivered a grant to Communities in Schools of Houston to help address an immediate need for mental health services in the 2018-19 school year by providing trauma-informed counseling and support groups to students at three schools where the need was high. We also delivered a grant to the Southeast Texas Food Bank in July, helping to address food insecurity in impacted communities. In August, we delivered grants to Disability Rights Texas to meet the legal advocacy needs of individuals with disabilities impacted by the storm, and to The Alliance for Multicultural Community Services in support of their ongoing efforts to help limited English proficient refugees, immigrants and under-served residents navigate resources. In October, we delivered a grant to Communities in Schools of Southeast Texas to help bolster basic needs for students, including food, uniforms and clothing, school supplies and psychological support. All grants distributed this year have had a meaningful impact on recovery for those who need it most.

In the months and years ahead, continued donations to our Hurricane Harvey relief efforts will enable us to remain active in Texas—helping children and families recover, thrive and build resiliency.

HURRICANE MARIA RECOVERY · PUERTO RICO

In September 2017, Hurricane Maria devastated Puerto Rico. In the storm's aftermath, many island residents faced catastrophic conditions and lacked access to basic necessities including clean water, food, power and medical care. More than a year later, clean up and recovery is still in the early stages.

After the storm, OpUSA quickly delivered a relief shipment containing water tabs to community-based partners on the

island. In 2018, we delivered additional shipments of much-needed relief supplies. Operation USA remains committed to helping long-term recovery efforts in Puerto Rico, and in 2019 will continue to assess opportunities to deliver in-kind material aid and cash grants.



HURRICANE IRMA · FLORIDA

In September 2017, Hurricane Irma battered Florida, causing catastrophic damage and flooding, especially in coastal and island areas. Though a year has passed, recovery continues for many impacted communities.

This year, Operation USA made three additional grants to the Harry Chapin Food Bank of Southwest Florida in Ft. Myers to bolster food security for vulnerable groups including children, families, low-income seniors and veterans. These grants enabled the food bank to expand several programs, including the addition of several new mobile food pantries—set up at a community park, church or school parking lot or other accessible site to provide fresh produce, canned food, bread and grains to clients—and an increased distribution of food kits containing canned fruits and vegetables, proteins, grains and cereal and, when possible, fresh produce, bread and frozen meat to seniors.



We are so pleased to be able to support such a worthy organization. In the year ahead, we will continue to assess opportunities to provide additional support to community partners in Florida.



AWESOME GIRLS · LOUISIANA

OpUSA has supported the Awesome Girls Program in New Orleans since Hurricane Katrina devastated the area in 2005.

This year, in addition to providing ongoing support to the program, we also sent the girls and some of their family members to see the award-winning film Black Panther. This experience not only provided a fun outing for the girls, but also sparked a meaningful dialogue about issues they may face in their own lives. After their movie day, program leaders shared this update: "The female characters featured in the film were awesome role models of what we hope our Girls aspire to become: multifaceted and effective people. The Girls will discuss other facets of the film in coming weeks (e.g. How does race, gender or other "-isms" affect what is important to all of us?). The movie is rich in issues. Thanks so much for your generosity. The Awesome Girls give the movie a BIG THUMBS UP!"

We are so pleased to be able to provide opportunities like these for these wonderful young leaders.



WILDFIRE RESPONSE & RECOVERY · CALIFORNIA

On the heels of a devastating 2017 wildfire season, fires that burned across California in 2018 proved to be even more catastrophic for both people and wildlife.

Early this year, OpUSA distributed multiple grants to partner organizations working to combat the effect of last year's disastrous fires. In May, we delivered a grant to Social Advocates for Youth (SAY) to assist with ongoing wildfire recovery programs aimed at improving the lives of homeless youth who–already vulnerable before the fires–have struggled in the aftermath to find safe and stable housing. In June, we delivered a grant to On The Move's Voices program to support additional youth services including addressing immediate material needs, street outreach and emergency financial assistance. These funds will help improve the lives of impacted youths and help to build resiliency for future disasters.

In July, a new wave of devastating wildfires swept across California. In Northern California, the Camp Fire became the deadliest fire in the state's history, burning more than 150,000 acres, destroying more than 18,800 structures (mostly homes) and killing 86 people. In Southern California, the Woolsey Fire in Malibu/Los Angeles burned more than 96,000 acres and destroyed more than 1,643 structures as well as huge swaths of the city's wildlife preserves. Several smaller fires also burned across the state, damaging communities and displacing families. As new needs emerged in the wake of these more recent fires, we doubled down on our commitment to providing much-needed relief and recovery aid.

Thanks to corporate partners Honeywell and Starbucks, late in 2018, OpUSA delivered clean up materials and basic necessities including toiletries, hygiene and first aid supplies to impacted communities. In the months ahead, we will begin distributing grants and delivering financial support to partner organizations supporting rebuilding and long-term recovery efforts. We are grateful for the generosity of all those who have contributed to these much-needed wildfire recovery efforts.

HURRICANE FLORENCE RESPONSE

NORTH & SOUTH CAROLINA

In September, Hurricane Florence struck the United States' eastern coast, with extreme winds and record rainfall causing extensive damage and widespread flooding across the Carolinas. Recovery will continue through 2019, with both states facing extensive clean up and long-term rebuilding efforts.

In September, Operation USA, via longtime partner Honeywell, delivered a shipment of in-kind material aid including safety gloves, safety goggles, masks and filters and safety boots. These items were distributed to partners on the ground in impacted communities, and aided in cleanup and mold remediation efforts in the wake of record flooding caused by Hurricane Florence. In October, again thanks to the generosity of Honeywell, we delivered grants to the Harvest Hope Food Bank in South Carolina and to the Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina to distribute emergency disaster relief and food supplies in impacted areas. In November, we delivered grants to the Good Shepherd Center in North Carolina help re-house displaced families, and to Nourish NC to further bolster food security. Also in November, we delivered a grant to Communities in Schools Cape Fear to support a trauma-informed resiliency taskforce.

As recovery continues, OpUSA will remain committed to partners in North and South Carolina in the months and years ahead.





HURRICANE MICHAEL RESPONSE FLORIDA

In October, Hurricane Michael made landfall in Florida as a Category 4 storm, causing widespread damage across the state, which was still recovering from the 2017 hurricane season. Extreme winds destroyed homes and structures, and several people were killed.

Operation USA is currently assessing opportunities to provide in-kind material aid and cash grants, and will distribute funds to partner organizations in 2019 to aid in long-term recovery.

INTERNATIONAL RECOVERY

EARTHQUAKE RECOVERY · MEXICO

In September 2017, two major earthquakes struck Mexico. This year, OpUSA continued to support ongoing relief and recovery efforts in impacted areas.

In February, we delivered a grant to Fundación ORIGEN AC, helping to support women who were impacted by the earthquakes by providing supplies for commercial and income-generating activities. In June, we delivered a grant to ProNatura México AC to fund a post-earthquake school rehabilitation project alongside corporate partner Honeywell. OpUSA programs staff members traveled to Mexico to aid the rehabilitation. In 2019, as funding allows, we will continue to support recovery efforts in Mexico.





ONGOING SUPPORT . THE PHILIPPINES

This year, we continued to provide funding and ongoing support to the Ngolos Honeywell Elementary School in Guiuan, where we focused recovery efforts following the 2013 typhoon that devastated the area. In April, we were so excited to see the school celebrate its fourth graduating class since it re-opened its doors to students in 2015.

OpUSA is grateful for the continued partnership with teachers, students and their families at Ngolos Elementary, and we look forward to working together in the school year ahead.

REFUGEE ASSISTANCE · BANGLADESH

In recent years, the world has faced unprecedented refugee crises. In Myanmar, unspeakable acts of violence have been committed against the Rohingya people, a Muslim minority group, triggering a humanitarian crisis in neighboring Bangladesh as hundreds of thousands of Rohingya refugees are living in makeshift camps after fleeing their homes.

In February, OpUSA delivered a grant to partner organization APCD for the purchase of blankets and cold weather relief items. These materials were distributed to 820 refugee families who had recently arrived in Bangladesh at Ukhia Upazilla without warm clothes or other supplies. We are so pleased to be able to support these efforts, thanks in large part to a major gift from a donor, and hope to provide additional relief support in the months and year ahead.



UPDATES FROM THE OPERATION USA WAREHOUSE

SHIPPING & MATERIAL AID

In 2018, OpUSA's shipping programs were once again dominated by the distribution of medical supplies and hospital equipment to clinics and hospitals here in the United States and communities around the world. Generous corporate partners including Kaiser Permanente and Lakeside Medical Associates were crucial to our ability to deliver these materials where they were needed most.

This year we also delivered several shipments of relief supplies to disaster-impacted communities. Thanks to corporate partners including Honeywell, SCORE

American Soccer Company, DayOne Response, Keson, Youngstown Glove Company, Vans, Misubishi Engine North America, Pelican Products and SoCalGas, OpUSA sent water purification supplies, clothing and sports uniforms, clean up and rebuilding supplies, tools, generators and other recovery materials to communities in the United States, Puerto Rico, Mexico, Nicaragua, El Salvador, Kenya, Guatemala and Afghanistan.

We are so grateful to all our corporate partners, without whom our shipping programs would not be possible.





BETTER WITH BOOKS HOLIDAY GIVEAWAY

In December, OpUSA provided warehouse space and services to our friends at Better With Books for a holiday book giveaway benefiting children in the Greater Los Angeles Area. During the giveaway, more than 5,000 children living below the poverty line—in addition to many Head Start Classrooms across LA—received more than 7,000 books and other educational materials, together valued at more than \$154,000.

Operation USA is so pleased to have been able to participate in this meaningful program, helping to break the cycle of poverty and illiteracy and change the story of our shared future. Congratulations to Better With Books for this successful endeavor!



LONG-TERM RECOVERY GIVE & IT GETS THERE: FOR THE LONG HAUL

When disasters strike, impacted communities often receive an outpouring of media attention and support. Across the country and around the globe, humanitarians from all walks of life step up to provide much-needed relief with cash donations, material aid and other support and encouragement to help survivors rebuild their lives and livelihoods. Unfortunately, too often that attention and support fades after a few weeks or months—though recovery often continues for many years.

While some humanitarian aid groups act as first responders, Operation USA works differently—placing an increased emphasis on long-term recovery programs. In the immediate aftermath of a disaster we deploy material aid and distribute cash grants where they are needed most—often to the most overlooked and under-served groups—but we also go one step further to maintain relationships with those groups for the long haul. For years after a disaster has abated, we continue working to understand the priorities and needs for recovery identified by those living and working in a disaster-impacted community, and we strive to provide the most meaningful types of support for as long as it is needed.



By investing in our programs, you enable us to carry out our mission of helping vulnerable communities for the long haul. Your continued support ensures that communities torn apart by disasters not only recover, but also build resiliency and thrive. Every gift to Operation USA allows these communities to play an active role in determining what type of support will be most impactful, giving them a renewed sense of hope and a positive outlook for the future.


